Saraphina





Fedner is four years old and this is his third time with kwashiorkor. He was very swollen upon admission, weighing 24 pounds. He lost 5 ³/₄ pounds of water weight and then began to gain healthy weight on the Medika Mamba Program. He is now at 26 pounds.

Saraphina was admitted with kwashiorkor, and weighed 22 pounds. She lost 2 ½ pounds of water weight before beginning to gain healthy weight. She is now up to 23 pounds. At home she has a widowed papa raising her four sisters and four brothers.

When **Etina** was admitted, her hair had turned brittle and was falling out, her skin was breaking down, and she was swollen from kwashiorkor. She weighed 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of that being water weight. She is now at a healthy weight of 25 $\frac{1}{2}$ pounds.

As skinny as **Osner** was, weighing 19 ½ pounds upon admission, it's hard to believe that he was retaining over 1 ½ pounds of water due to kwashiorkor. It took him nine weeks on the Medika Mamba Program to get to his ideal weight for his height. His current weight is 24 ¾ pounds.

Understanding Malnutrition

We see two main forms of malnutrition that come through the clinic. If the child is severe enough they can be admitted to our inpatient care facility. Both forms, if not treated, can lead to death.

The first form is called Marasmus. This form of malnutrition is where the child is emaciated (skinny). Their body weight is reduced to less that 60% of the normal body weight for the child's age. It leads to extensive tissue and muscle wasting. Other common characteristics include dry skinand loose skin folds . There is also drastic loss of fat and muscle. The prognosis is better than it is for kwashiorkor, but many still can die.

The second and more deadly form is called kwashiorkor. It is an acute form of childhood protein-energy malnutrition. The low protein intake leads to some specific signs: edema of the hands and feet, irritability, anorexia, dermatitis rash, hair discoloration, decreased muscle mass, diarrhea, fatigue, increase in more severe infections, large belly, and lethargy.

Two things that we use for both of these forms of malnutrition is the F-75 therapeutic milk and the medika mamba. Along with basic medication and lots of love, many of the children can recover after and extended stay.

Children with severe malnutrition are at risk for several life-threatening problems like hypoglycemia, hypothermia, serious infections, and severe electrolyte disturbances. Because of these issues, most should be admitted to an inpatient care facility.
