Bonjour!

Well, it has been a long time since you have gotten a Haiti newsletter, but that sure doesn't mean that we haven't been busy around here. We continue to see 150-200 patients per day in the clinic. There are 42 children in the Rescue Center. We have 40 people on staff. We are open 24 hours a day for emergencies. There are two Peace Corps volunteers in our local area with whom we have collaborated on several projects. We struggle each time we go into town with road blocks and riots. We celebrated Charles & Lori's wedding. A work team from Indiana came to help us for 10 days in January. Enoch and Licia are expecting a baby boy in mid-April. Carmelo is almost done with homeschool for this year. We continue to look for new opportunities to improve the lives of the Haitians in our surrounding community. Zach plans to come to Indiana in March and Gretchen will come in May. They will be traveling, speaking, raising funds, and packing a semi-container to ship to Haiti. Hopefully, these few pages will give you a better idea of what we've been doing, what we hope to accomplish in the future, and how you can become involved in sharing and showing the Love of God



Our home continues to RESCUE & RECOVER malnourished, burned, orphaned, and abandoned children all over Haiti. As other missionaries are leaving and the country's crisis escalates, it is the poor and the children who suffer and die. ~~We are opened and working when others have closed and ran for cover.~~ Our location and God's protection have enabled us to continue to be a blessing to Cazale and many other areas in Haiti. We are currently housing and caring for 42 children ranging in ages from 2 months to 8 years old. Each and every one of these children would have died if our doors where closed. Since we began in 1999, God has graciously allowed us to save over 1000 children and touch their families with the Love and Word of Jesus Christ. For example, Maricia, the 7 yr old girl pictured above, has 6 other siblings and lives in a distant mountain village. She had been living at the local witch doctor's house. When her mother saw her condition, she removed her from the house under much protest. Her mother carried her 5 hours in order to get help for her child. She is getting loving care, healing medicines, and nutritious food 5 times a day. She is gaining weight well. Our staff teach her Christian songs and stories. When her parents visit, they receive health education and a loving Christian witness

We love Children! We love to help their bodies and their spirits grow and give God glory! Children are close to everyone's heart. That makes it so hard to see one suffering in need. But, we can all rejoice when one is rescue and recovered. Maricia, pictured in the last newsletter, is doing much better. She is eating well and gaining weight. She participates in singing, prayer, and church service with a energetic and joyful spirit. Well, you can see the change for yourself...



We have had several orphans brought in over the past 2 years. Most of the mother's died at childbirth from blood loss when the midwife pulled on the umbilical cord to quickly remove the placenta. This custom kills hundred of mothers every year. We have given education on this in almost every midwife conference, but many of the older ones refuse to change this practice. These orphans usually die after a few weeks from starvation and diarrhea because the families can't afford powdered formula. Once we began taking these orphans, word spread quickly. We have been able to give them formula and proper care until they can begin eating solid foods. We have recently sent many of these kids back home

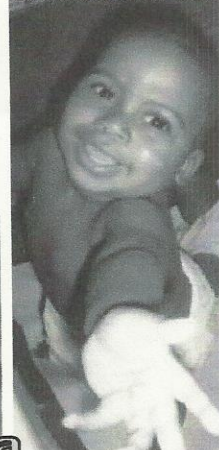
under the supervision of their father, aunt, or grandma. Here's a few pictures

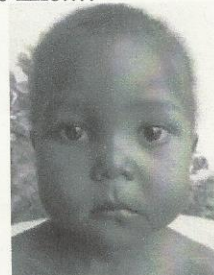

Kwashiorkor

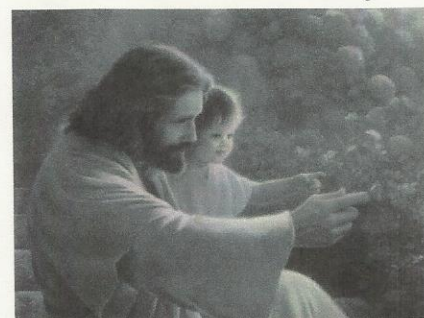

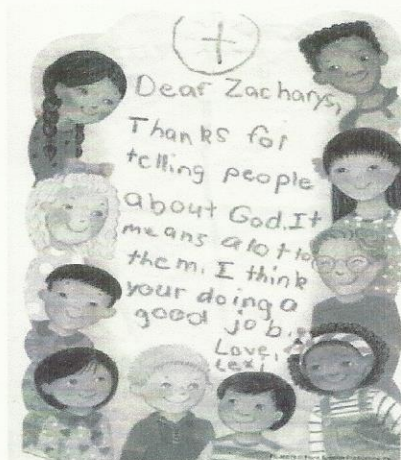

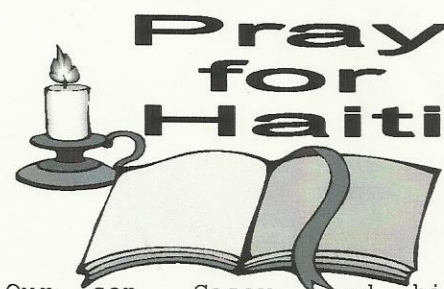

There are many areas in which Haiti is needing much improvement. From what you are seeing on the television, it might seem like an impossible situation, but we all know that all things are possible for Our Creator. We are in a position to affect a whole zone of Haiti with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We have many projects in which we are researching, planning, and budgeting. We know things like reforestation, soil conservation, building roads and bridges, well drilling, health education, irrigation canals, and electricity will improve the quality of life for the population in our area. You must also realize that in all of our humanitarian effort, we are putting God in the spotlight. All glory goes to our Lord and Savior. The people often turn from Voodoo practices and are converted to Christianity because their living conditions are improved by loving Christians. We are His Hands and Feet in Cazale. Though we see the possibilities and are eager to put our hands to work, often the financing just isn't there. **Zach and Gretchen will be coming back to the states to raise funds this spring for several reasons which are stated below;**

1. \$10,000 to buy and ship a semi-container of supplies in July. We already have 3 storage units full of supplies. Please help us pack every Saturday in May & June.
2. Basic Monthly Supporters – one time gifts help, but we need faithful monthly givers for mission needs. We receive basically the same monthly income as when we first came to Haiti. We need a minimum of \$5000 per month to finance what is currently functioning.
3. \$2000 for hospital, doctor, room and medicine costs for birth of Enoch & Licia's baby boy due April 14<sup>th</sup>.

4. \$7200 for 2 years rent for the Rescue Center and housing for the Zachary's and Betor's (all one building)
5. \$30,000 for two heavy duty, long lasting vehicles to haul supplies, teams, and to run errands into the capital – Toyota pick-up & Toyota Land Cruiser (best vehicle made for Haiti's rough roads)
6. \$1500 for a copier for charts, newsletters, and correspondence
7. Funds to ship the well drilling rig, buy & ship dozer, and construction equipment to make and repair roads.
8. Funds for land and building a mission complex which will begin in the next few years
9. Generator – 15000KW - Our current one has over 8000 hours and we will soon need another.



**Pray for Haiti**

Our son, Casey, and his wife, Briana, are very much a part of our ministry work. Casey spent his high school years here and graduated from a Christian school in Port-au-Prince. Three years later, while visiting Haiti, he met Briana. She was visiting and getting some first-hand experience on the field as God has called her to be a missionary doctor. They were married in July 2002 and are pursuing education which will eventually bring them back to work with us and the Haitian people. They were able to visit in December for the first time in 3 ½ years. Conditions were not good in country then. We stayed here in the mountains just enjoying family time and Charles & Lori's wedding. The following is an excerpt of a letter he wrote us soon after returning to Washington state.



'Not too many people are happy with Aristide in the international community. WE shall see what the future holds. As always, we pray that God protect my family and what they are a part of, in addition to the many brothers and sisters in Christ we have in Haiti. It is truly a desperate situation, but God often brings beauty out of ashes, light out of darkness, and life out of death. He is a glorious and majestic God, who takes tremendous care of His people. When people, who are slaves to sin, are controlled by their own lusts and passions, and they are in power over 8 million people; well, that is cause for concern. Perhaps God will raise someone up who fears His Name to lead the people of Haiti and set an example by giving God the Glory. Perhaps, just as God allowed the Israelites to be enslaved in Egypt for hundreds of years, but finally delivered them; they will better understand His Glory and Majesty. Perhaps this will be the case in Haiti. After 200 years of death, misery, and destruction; God will deliver them from the snare of the devil. But thanks be to God for remnant of faithful ones who remain in Haiti. Despite possessing nothing, and though their bodies are fading away, they hold fast to the Truth, knowing God is their strength and portion in this life. These are the people that I learned so much from during my time in Haiti. I miss that place. I miss those people.'

Only God knows what the days ahead will bring for Haiti, the people here, and our ministry. Thousands and thousands of Haitians, missionaries to the country, and interested people like you have been praying and believing for God to deliver. We hope and believe God is orchestrating this for His Glory. He is raising Haiti to be a light for all nations.

**Franklin**

You know how that saying goes "If you think you've got it bad, just look around, there's always someone worse." Well, for me, it's Franklin. He is a 27 years old albino Haitian with skin cancer. For some that is all I have to say for you to understand his situation. But many of you have yet to comprehend his grave circumstance. We have all experienced a family member or close friend that has battled the terrible

disease. All superficial wants, worldly desires, and outward appearances fall to the side as the person struggles to only stand and cling to life itself. Searching throughout the nation at times, cancer patients examine their options for first-rate treatments, up-to-the-minute technology and top-quality caregivers from thousands of available hospitals, clinics, and doctors. They ask second, third, and fourth options. They try alternative medicine, health supplements, and controlled diets. They trust in medication, hypnosis, and prayer. The multitude of treatments routes have lead to a huge success in this life-and death battle. Cancer has claimed many precious lives, but many more have overcome their illness to survive many more special years. Research is aggressively ongoing to find better treatments and cures. I write all this to remind you what you know and experience in your world - the United States. Franklin's world is Haiti. It is much different. When the diagnosis is cancer, the patient knows his future is death. They don't search the internet for current treatments. There are none. There is hardly isn't even electricity let alone computers and the internet. They can't go to specialist. There are none. In fact, the main hospitals in Haiti have had their doors shut for over 2 months due to political fighting, rioting, and protesting. The last option for most Americans is the first option for many Haitians -PRAYER! Franklin is no exception. From that first day he walked in the clinic over 4 years ago, he professed Christ as his Savior and God as his Hope. The



black crusty golf ball size tumors on his back oozed a continuous flow of yellow, rotten-smelling pus. Thinking we could give him a chance of living with early treatment, we spent hundreds of dollars sending him to the top hospitals and doctors in Haiti only to be rejected and disappointed after every appointment. There was no cancer specialist, no chemo, no radiation, and no hope. There seemed to be nothing we could do, but Franklin always had hope. Though he lived in a town a 2-hour drive away, he still came to see us every 2 or 3 months. As time went on and the cancer progressed, no one would let him ride in the tap-taps (public transportation). He still had hope. He walked in the hot Haitian sun causing his eyes to be red, swollen, and blinded. Each visit, he revealed another doctor or clinic that a friend of a friend had told him about. The "treatments" often cost \$20-\$100 American. We usually always gave him the money even though we had little hope of success. Sometimes this money paid for a couple of betedine dressings, but usually it just helped him eat for a month or two. He still had hope. Franklin always knew there was a treatment, a solution, a healing. He just had to find it. He never gave up. I have always wanted to write a story here in the newsletter about him. Something like how he was treated and cancer-free and won others to the

Lord through his healing. It sounded like something God would do to bring Glory to Himself. But my will is not His Will. My earthly mind is limited by my earthly body. I can't see the "big picture" of what God plans to do with all of us. I wanted to affect Haiti for Christ, yet it has affected me. It has done more good for my spirit than I can ever do for sick Haitian bodies. Yes, Franklin's body and situation is so much more hopeless and worse than mine. But his spirit; oh my, HIS SPIRIT, is such an example to me. His faith never wavered. He always had Hope. He never cursed God as the cancer deformed his face. He never questioned his illness as he felt his strength slipping away. He knew his healing was always close at hand. Indeed, he was healed. I believe God rejoiced to receive Franklin into His Kingdom on January 6<sup>th</sup>. Though he doesn't come to encourage me with scriptures and prayers like he did in the past, he is still routing for me and you on the sidelines of Heaven. I'll be so glad to see him again one day to say thanks for giving me a wonderful example of Hope to carry with me through the rest of my life.

## WHY DID WE STAY?

Many have wondered why, when the U.S. government asked Americans to leave, we stayed. The answer is simple - we are committed to where and what God called us to. Each one of us felt God would have us stay and keep ministering. We had no

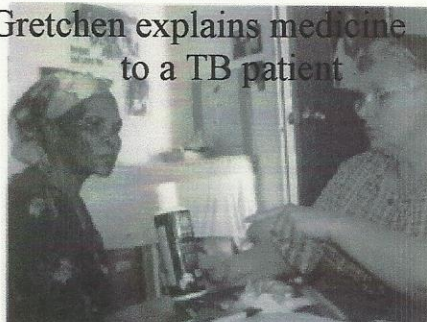
fear. After 10 years here under all kinds of duress, danger, harassment, persecution, and robbery; God has kept us and provided for us. He is FAITHFUL! We encourage ourselves daily with the Word which guides and directs our path. We were not out on main roads or in the bigger towns that experienced so much uncertainty and violence. We are well hidden back in the mountains where we provide health care for over 40,000 people. Our patients are family. Most hospitals and clinics are closed nation wide. We remain open to provide quality life saving health care. We have had an epidemic of typhoid and malaria. There have been hundreds treated with life giving medications. We have been able to give strong antibiotics for massive infections such as a grapefruit size abscess in the groin of a 7 year old girl and a 45 year old man with an infected tooth & gums that literally ate a hole through to the underside of his jaw. There have been many burns lately as parents are in the fields turning over the soil with picks and hoes so the ground will be ready when the rains come. Often they must leave their children at home to fend for themselves. They are usually burned while trying to make their lunch. The common practice is to make a 'medicine' of toothpaste, eggs, soot, and ashes to spread on the burn. This often causes huge infections which sometime never fully heal and always leave a scar. We are able to give pain medication, antibiotics, and change their dressings each day. Yesterday, we cared for a lady whose legs were burnt when a gas tank exploded. A 36 yr old man was working in his garden when he tripped and fell into a pile of rubble that he had been clearing off. He was stuck in his right calf by a stick which broke off in his leg. Four days later, he came to us and we pulled out a 5 inch portion that had broken off inside of him and gave medicine for pain and infection. A 34 year old man was climbing in one of his trees to get oranges to make juice for his kid that had a cold. The branch broke and, as he fell, his arm got caught by another limb. It tore a 16 inches circumferencing his left forearm from close to his wrist, down to his elbow, and back up about half-way to his wrist. It



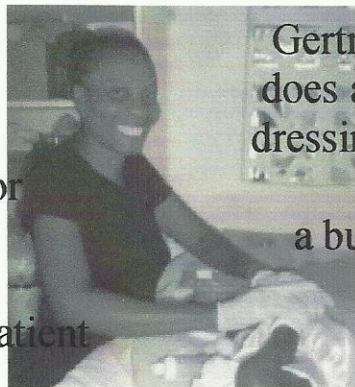
tore the skin away from the muscle, severed many veins and arteries, and left a gaping open wound. The skin had to be pulled back and put into place with 89 stitches. An 18 year old man was carrying a homemade gun when he tripped and fell. The gun exploded leaving shrapnel throughout his face, ear, and right arm. We pulled out 14 BB size balls. These people had no where else to turn. The roads were blocked. The hospitals closed. These are only a few that benefited from us staying. As other missions closed down and left, we received over 25,000 pounds of food to distribute in our area. We also received truckloads of medicine & other supplies as a mission was trying to clear their warehouse to discourage robbers. This enabled us to continue helping others. God opened the doors wide open for us to receive so that we could channel these items to the neediest. Why did we stay? Simply put, because we love God and we love people. He is our Protection in danger and our Rock in the storm. We trust in Him for our every need and He is faithful indeed!

We will be going back to International Aid in June to purchase supplies for the coming year. The medicine and supplies are purchased for \$0.10 on the dollar or less. We would also like to buy 4 more small rolling layette-type beds for newborns and a very

needed isolette for premature baby care. We can also buy pallets/skids of medicine at VERY cheap prices that would last us several months. It is better for us to buy in bulk from this mission-oriented, Christian group than buy meds here in Haiti.

## **A Word From DAD**

Where are we going? What does the future hold for this mission? What is the perfect will of God for us? What does God want us to do? These questions race around in my mind daily. I would like to share with you some of the visions and thoughts that I believe the Spirit of God has revealed to me.

First of all, I would like to ask for your forgiveness for my stumbling around in the wilderness for the last few years. God has allowed me to go through the refiner's fire to remove a lot of impurities and excess baggage from my old life. Last December, before we returned to Haiti, the Spirit of God said, "It is time to take this ministry to the next level." I responded, "I didn't think I was ready yet." God said, "By saying that, you ARE ready. You will depend on Me, not yourself." I believe God wants us to build a mission complex consisting of



housing for a mission staff, a depot and dock for shipping containers from the States, a hospital and clinic, a Rescue Center for 100 children, housing for long and short term mission teams, a large garage for construction and mechanical work, a Bible School, water cisterns, educational center and trade school. Also, at some later time, to rise up 6 other Rescue Centers in different parts of Haiti.

Interwoven in all this is the showing and sharing the love of Jesus Christ; feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, building homes for the homeless, preaching the Gospel, healing the broken hearted and setting the captives free. Matthew 25: 40 Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.

To achieve these goals, it is going to take a lot of money and sacrifice. Three years ago, God told me to raise 10 million dollars and put it in a foundation fund that would run the mission. I told God I couldn't do that. He said, "I know you can't. I will do it. All you have to do is give the vision and I will touch the hearts of men and women to achieve My Purpose.

About now, probably some of you are thinking, Zach has gone crazy or has been in the Caribbean sun too long.

As the conditions in Haiti have drastically changed these last few weeks, there is a void spiritually. We, as the church, need to move quickly to fill that void with the power and love of God. God has positioned this ministry to touch thousands of Haitian lives for His Glory! If this truly is God's Visions for His ministry through us then let us all be stirred by the Spirit of God

to quickly bring it to reality. We should all thank God for allowing us to have the honor and privilege to touch the nation of Haiti for Him. Lord increase our faith that Your Will might be achieved in Jesus' Name. To God Be All the Glory! Amen.

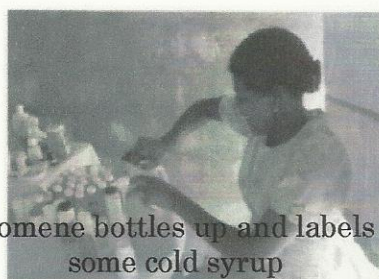

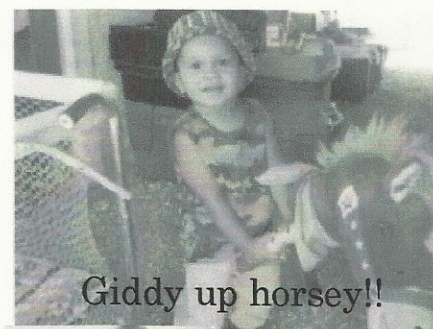

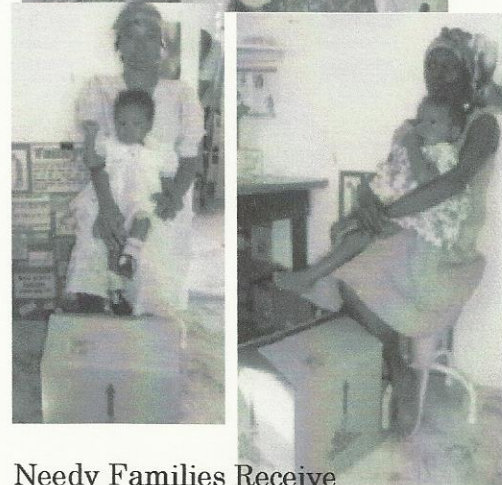
