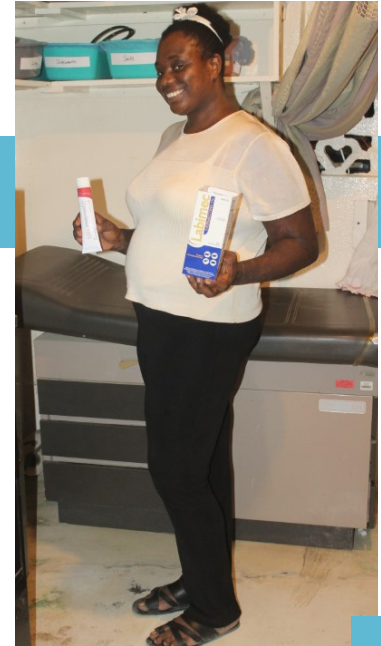
Rodley was admitted to a clinic with symptoms of diarrhea, vomiting, fever, and kwashiorkor. He was too weak to hold his head up when admitted but began eating medika mamba each day and gained 4.5kg of good weight after treatment. He comes from a family of four living in a one-room house, and his mother sells gravel to construction workers to support the family. The family is grateful for the clinic's help in saving Rodley's life and prays for continued blessings.

While working in the RHFH ER, we had a lady come with difficulty breathing, fever, and low oxygen. The clinic team worked fast and within minutes, she was on oxygen. After 6 days, she was happy to be well enough to go home. **THANK YOU!** In the name of all those who have low oxygen and trouble breathing, we thank you for this life saving help of oxygen concentrators.

Jalmire had itching all over her body – the kind that doesn't let you sleep. She had gone to doctors and tried everything to get rid of it, but nothing had helped. She lives about a 3.5 hour drive from the clinic, but a friend suggested she come to the RHFH clinic. Her skin was so bad that many people were saying she was VIH+, but testing revealed she was negative. Relieved with that knowledge, treatment was started with medication and cream. Her skin began to change, she was able to sleep, and she was so happy. She felt support and comfort at the clinic because the staff accepted, educated, and encouraged her. She congratulates the clinic for the solution that was found for her healing. With great improvements underway, she is hopeful for a full recovery.



My daughter was very sick. A clinic near us said she was too sick to care for her and they sent us 6 hours away to a place that would admit my daughter. We are a family of farmers and 11 of us live in a 4 room home. My daughter had a fever, was losing weight, and had no energy. Then, she began to not want to eat anything and her feet and legs began to swell up. After doing testing, she began treatment for TB and malnutrition. The results I received was a child that was alive and happy. I want to tell everyone thank you. These people took care of my family when we were sick and in need. They fed us, gave us medications, and made sure we had a place to stay. I really do not have enough words to thank this clinic for what they have done for us. I do not feel like there is another place in my area that would have given me the service that I was given here for my family. Thank you, thank you, thank you, everyone!



Living conditions in the village are miserable for the majority of people. It is difficult to leave the house to buy food due to lack of money or availability of food. Those who make a living from buying and selling food face greater insecurity due to roadblocks, shootings, and robbers. Some are forced to travel by boat to Port-au-Prince to buy food, but face robbery on the water. The situation is dire and difficult for anyone to live in.
